This workshop prepares participants to become Level 1 Reiki practitioners. Through a series of experiential attunements, participants will be initiated and opened to Reiki energy. The class will meet for a day-long session, followed by a half day at the group leader's home where participants will experience a full Reiki treatment. 1101 Painting with Light – a Nature Photography Experience

Monday 8:00 – 10:00 a.m. (8 weeks) April 18 through June 13, 2016

This group will visit a different natural location, such as Audubon refuges, each week for picture-taking walks. During the rest of the week, participants share, critique, and revise their images using a closed Facebook group seen only by members of this group.

Walks will be within 30 minutes to an hour's drive of Fall River. This is a learn-by-doing experience, not a course in photography, but participants will receive coaching and photography tips in the field and on Facebook. Fieldwork will start on site at 8:00 a.m., and each session will last approximately two hours. In the event of inclement weather, the walk will be postponed and the study group extended an extra week in order to hold a total of eight walks. The study group sessions will end when the group has completed eight walks. You may use any camera (including phone), but a Digital Single Lens Reflex with telephoto lens and photo editing software is recommended. You must be able to post pictures to Facebook.

1103 Camille Claudel and Auguste Rodin – Their True Story

This course will bring the story of two great French sculptors to light through film and short readings, while developing conversational skills and introducing or reviewing basic French grammar and vocabulary. Topics such as numbers, greetings and salutations, colors, dates, family members, verbs in the present tense, and foods will be introduced or reviewed orally, with written practice provided--all within the cultural parameters of the art of Claudel and Rodin, as well as the art of those influenced by them or vice versa.

1106 What's Up! – Understanding our Marvelous Night Sky

Tuesday 9:30 – 11:30 a.m. (6 weeks) March 8 through April 12, 2016

This study group will investigate the marvels of the night sky. There will be sessions on historical perspective – how our understanding of the universe evolved, understanding the size and scale of outworldly objects; how to navigate the constellations; a primer on everything visible in the night sky from satellites to galaxies; and an introduction to observing including how to observe with naked eye, through binoculars, and small telescopes. There will also be an opportunity to observe objects we are studying through Roger's telescope.

Group Leaders: Roger Menard is an amateur astronomer and a member of the Astronomical Society of New England (ASSNE). He has his own small observatory and spends most clear nights observing the skies. He tries to keep current on most aspects of astronomy and astrophysics.

1107 History of Westport and Fairhaven Tuesday 9:30 – 11:30 a.m. (5 weeks) March 15 through April 12, 2016

The first three weeks of this course will narrate Westport's early history, from its shaping by the glaciers to the big changes of the 1950s and 60s. Topics include King Philip's War, the early settlements at the Head and the Point, the American Revolution, how

Westport split from Dartmouth, early industrial development, the whaling industry, the effects of the Civil War, and the forces that shaped Westport in the early 20th century. Along the way, we'll meet unforgettable citizens like Paul Cuffe and Charlotte White, plus brave soldiers, slaves, slave traders, intrepid whalemen, and ordinary farmers, fishermen, and mill workers who helped make the town what it is today.

For the final two weeks, the group will explore parts of the town of Fairhaven. On April 5, the class will meet at Town Hall to take the Henry Huttleston Rogers walking tour of the town. On April 12, they will meet at Fort Phoenix to tour this Revolutionary War era fort.

Group Leaders: Tony Connors has had a lifelong interest in Westport and has been teaching and writing about Westport history for ten years. He edited Volume I of Conflicts in American History (2010) and is the author of Ingenious Machinists: Two Inventive Lives from the American Industrial Revolution (2014).

Chris Richard, a native of Fairhaven, is the Director of Tourism for the town. He is an expert in all things relating to Fairhaven.





1108 Intermediate Bridge Tuesday 9:30 – 11:30 a.m. (10 weeks) February 16 through April 19, 2016

The focus of Intermediate Bridge is to improve the skill level of those already comfortable with the basics of bridge, including evaluating, bidding, and elementary play of the hand. During this ten-week study group, group leaders will present a variety of topics designed to enhance players' skills at bidding, playing, and defending bridge hands. Bidding: Stayman, Blackwood, Gerber, and Jacoby 2NT; Playing: making a plan and developing tricks through promotion, length, and the finesse, as well as eliminating losers through ruffing and discarding;

<u>Defending:</u> leads against suit and no-trump contracts and defensive signals.

Intermediate Bridge provides a supportive, friendly environment for class members to interact with one another, stay mentally fit, and just possibly improve their bridge skills along the way! Please come join us.


1109 Spanish I - An Introduction to the Language Tuesday 9:30 – 11:30 a.m. (6 weeks) March 8 through April 12, 2016

This class will be an introduction to Spanish with the purpose of giving all participants a solid foundation for speaking, writing and understanding the target language. Cultural aspects will also be included in each session. No prior knowledge of Spanish is needed.

1112 The Art of the Short Story (The Best American Short Stories, published in the Calendar Year 2015)

Tuesday 2:30 – 4:30 p.m. (6 weeks) April 19 through May 24, 2016

This course will study the art of the modern short story, examining both content and style, and using as a text *The Best American Short Stories 2015, T. C. Boyle*, editor (Mariner). This is the hundredth volume in the distinguished series that seeks to honor the best short fiction published in U. S. and Canadian magazines in the preceding calendar year. The series editor, Heidi Pitlor, winnowed the list from about 3,000 stories to 120, from which the guest editor, the acclaimed writer T. C. Boyle, selected the winning 20. Those 20 reflect a vibrant range of characters, from a numb wife who feels alive only in the presence of violence to a new widower coming to terms with his sudden freedom; from a missing child to a champion speedboat racer. These stories will grab hold and surprise which, according to Boyle, is "what the best fiction offers."

James Cronin is a retired judge with an undergraduate degree in English from Harvard College and recent continuing education courses in literature and creative writing from Brown University, Harvard Extension School, and Frequency Writers.

Both group leaders have led previous courses in the short story for The Second Half.

1113 Political Polarization I Wednesday 9:30 – 11:30 a.m. (8 weeks) March 30 through May 18, 2016

Political polarization is undeniably the most troublesome feature of contemporary American politics. Political parties today are more internally unified and ideologically distinctive than they have been in over a century. This study group will explore the causes and the consequences of political polarization in the United States. Some of the specific questions that the study group will discuss are: What is political polarization? What caused party polarization? What roles do parties play in the democratic process? What does science know about the personalities of conservatives and liberals? Is each party equally to blame for the dysfunction? Are there any solutions to the current gridlock? The book It's Even Worse Than It Looks: How the American Constitutional System Collided with the New Politics of Extremism by Thomas E. Mann and Norman J. Ornstein is required reading for this course.

1114 21st Century Communications: Facebook and Beyond

Wednesday 9:30 – 11:30 a.m. (8 weeks) February 24 through April 13, 2016

Most of this study group will be devoted to learning Facebook, the most important of the new social media with roughly 1.5 billion users throughout the world. You also will spend some time learning Twitter and YouTube and may touch on related technologies. However, the goal is for everyone emerging from this study group to be an accomplished Facebook user. Every participant must have a Facebook account. In the weeks between study group sessions, all will be expected to post and comment in a closed Facebook group restricted to this activity. We will rely on handouts and the overhead projector with a live Facebook connection. I see Facebook as a critical social connectivity tool for seniors. As my 80-year-old Facebook friend Grace put it: "Facebook has about saved my life! As an elder, we need contacts and I just love it."

Group Leader: Greg Stone was Director of Internet Development at UMass Dartmouth, where he pioneered teaching online Web courses starting in 1996 and developed methods for teaching online and training faculty in the basics of online education at UMass Dartmouth and UMass Lowell. This early experience using the Web this way meshes nicely with the new age of social media tools such as Facebook.



1115 Art and Society of the Dutch Golden Age Wednesday 9:30 – 11:30 a.m. (8 weeks) February 24 through April 20, 2016

The seminar will be a thematic discussion of the art of the Dutch Golden Age from the late 16th to the early 18th centuries. The Dutch Republic was created during this period, became the first society in human history to achieve sustained economic growth, and, for a time, was at the center of the European economy and the first worldwide trading system. While we will not fail to feature the work of Rembrandt and Vermeer, we will focus on such larger issues as how this society developed what has been described as "a worldly art" that reflected the power and values of its urban ruling elites, as well as the lives and objects of its ordinary citizens. We will pay special attention to how the art of the period depicted the roles of women; how, despite the prevalence of secular subjects, it expressed religious and moral values; how new forms of genre developed landscape, portraiture, and still-life paintings; and how the Republic's worldwide trade and imperial connections produced an art of mapping.

Group Leader: Gerard Koot is an emeritus Professor of History at the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth, where he taught modern European history with a focus on Western Europe and Britain. He has directed seminars for teachers supported by the National Endowment for the Humanities on the seminar topic and is a native of the Netherlands.

1118 Conversational Spanish / Intermediate Wednesday noon – 2 p.m. (9 weeks) April 6 through June 1, 2016

This is an ongoing, progressive learning study group. It focuses on developing the participants' increased familiarity with the language and the ability to express oneself both orally and with the written word. Class discussion and group exercises are major components. *Spanish is Fun, Book 2*, is used as a reference text. Spanish music is also used as a learning tool. For new members, some basic prior knowledge of Spanish is required.

Group Leader: Mariano Merino is a native of Spain. He did graduate studies in Madrid. He has also done graduate work at Boston University and Rhode Island College. He has worked in the field of mental health.

1119 Ancient Greeks: Gods, Poets, Artists & Athletes

Wednesday 2:30 - 4:30 p.m. (6 weeks) March 30 through May 4, 2016

This workshop will focus on Ancient Greece, specifically the Classical Age of the 5th Century BCE. Professor Miraglia will trace the origins of Greek architecture, sculpture, and painting from the pre-classical Archaic period (800 BCE to 489 BCE) to the Golden Age that produced such monumental works as the Parthenon. Professor Taggie will present an overview of Greek history, including Homer's Trojan War and Mycenaean Age, the glorious 5th century, Greek's self-destructiveness resulting in the Peloponnesian War and Alexander the Great's conquests leading to the Hellenistic Age. The artistic and intellectual transition from Classical to Hellenistic Greece will also be discussed. Additional topics will include the origin of Greek Drama, Greek religion, and the Olympics. All classes will include a detailed Power Point presentation to emphasize the topics.

1120 Acoustic Guitar Class Thursday 9:30 – 11:00 a.m. (8 weeks) February 25 through April 14, 2016

Remember those days when you sat with friends, someone strumming an acoustic guitar? In this course you can recapture those times. These are not lessons. You won't learn to read music. You don't need any previous experience playing music or strumming a guitar. You will learn a few chords, a few rhythms, and half a dozen songs, and you'll make music with others in the class. For Morisot we'll sketch the face of an adult woman and then use crayons or chalk pastels or water colors. Water colors will be critical when we study Frankenthaler; we'll look at some different techniques to achieve a variety of effects when using this medium to emulate her signature style.



This study group is about how to set up and use Adobe Photoshop Lightroom CC, though most of the instruction will apply to earlier, stand-alone versions of this photo storage and editing software. It will be assumed participants have some version of Lightroom, but those without this software can - as of this writing in the Fall of 2015 - get a 30-day free trial version from Adobe. Lightroom is a popular photo storage and editing software, but the general techniques and tools it uses can be found in other photo editing packages. Strong emphasis will be placed on how to set up Lightroom properly as well as when and how to use the sophisticated editing tools. While demonstrations will be done on a Mac, the software works almost exactly the same on Windows. This is meant to complement the Painting with Light Study group, but you need not enroll in both.


