# 2105 The Human Mind, The Human Experience, and the Search for Identity

This participatory seminar will endeavor to trace the progression of human thinking and the development of personal identity by examining the historical evolution of both. It is said that a human being is matter that has become conscious of itself, and each one of us is part of that evolutionary process. The method for this study comes under the general heading of philosophical psychology (Wow!), and that simply means we will be doing a lot of thinking about thinking, including thinking about your thinking. This seminar is intended to be an adventure in intellectual wonderment (Wow!), and that means we will probably do a lot of laughing. The pursuit of truth is an endless journey, and this seminar is, hopefully, a small path within that process to understanding the universe and our place in it. The required book is The Shrink and the Sage by Julian Baggini and Antonio Macaro. We are going to place humanity on the therapeutic couch ( Wow!).

# 2106 A People's History of the United States: 1492 to the Present by Howard Zinn Part Three: Chapters 17 through 25

### 9:30 - 11:30 A.M. MARCH 23 THROUGH MAY 25 (10 WEEKS)

Author Howard Zinn captures the struggles of all who inhabited this continent, from Columbus to now, stories seldom found in the history books of our school days.

To protect their own position, the powerful have always used one segment of society strategically against another.

Early on, newly independent, formerly indentured, settlers were excluded from fertile coastal areas, forced westward, there to attempt establishing themselves on inferior land ... at the same time to endure attacks form the indigenous people who had lived there for centuries. This tactic removed possible competition from less powerful, but more numerous, members of the population. With black slavery written into the U.S. Constitution, it was a simple matter to advance the status of other poor whites to the position of "overseer," controlling and supervising slaves, creating more "classes" who would be competing with one another ... diverting attention from the powerful.

This dichotomy has been refined from then until now, as is easily seen today, within ethnic groups and our working society, white and nonwhite ... sharp divisions between "haves" and "have notes." Zinn didn't anticipate a pandemic. In the face of the pandemic, the behavior of the powerful is scandalous and a crisis is at hand. Here is the back story.

# 2112 A History of the British Isles, Part I: From the Beginnings to 1625

### 9:30 - 11:30 A.M. March 3 through April 14 (7 weeks)

How, when, and why did England become the dominant country in the British Isles? Are you curious about the Celtic world; Roman Britain; the Vikings in the British Isles; the Norman Conquest,; the emergence of "national" identity in England, Wales, Scotland, and Ireland; the competition between royal, aristocratic, and religious authority; the emergence of Parliament; the conflicts between Catholics and Protestants brought about by Henry VIII; the flowering of English culture under Elizabeth I; and the reign of James I, who brought England and Scotland under the same crown? To visualize all of these topics, we will use the first hour of each class to watch Simon Schama's acclaimed History of Britain (2000). Schama is a specialist in art history. These BBC films will treat us to a virtual tour of historical monuments, castles, cathedrals, countryside, art, personalities, and ideas of a world every different from our own. During the second hour we will discuss his interpretations.

(2) The concept of Crimes Against Humanity, Nuremberg Trial(s), Soviet and Eastern European war crimes trials, Western European (including West German) war crimes trials until the present day and the Jewish/Israeli honor courts.

# 2117 History and Art of Morocco from the Romans to the 20<sup>th</sup> Century

#### 2:30 - 4:30 P.M. April 21 through May 26 (6 weeks)

The Nation that is today's Morocco has a long and rich history and artistic tradition. This course will look at Morocco from the earliest cultural influences of Western Civilization brought first to the area by the Phoenicians and

later by the Romans. Topics will focus on the indigenous Berber people who after their conversion to Islam in the 7<sup>th</sup> Century led the conquest of the Iberian Peninsula (711-732). Since many of the conquering Berbers came from the Kingdom of Mauretania, they become known as the Moors in Iberian history. We will follow Moroccan history through World War II, when it was part of Vichy France, which inspired the iconic Bogie and Bacall movie Casablanca. Artistically there are many treasures to see: the Roman ruins at Volubilis, Meknes, the Moroccan Versailles, the Mohammed V Mausoleum, and the 9th Century al-karaouine mosque. The artistic achievements of the Moroccan Almoravid and dynasties and their influence on Iberian Andalusia Mudejar Art will also be considered.

#### **MOROCCO TOUR OCTOBER 2021**

There will also be an optional MSA Cultural Tour to Morocco in October 2021. It will include Fes, Rabat, Casablanca, Marrakesh, and other venues described in the course, like Meknes and Volubilis. The tour will include dinner in Casablanca at Rick's Café and an optional excursion from Marrakesh to the Atlas Mountains the last day of the tour. Transportation to/from Dartmouth to/from Logan will be provided as part of the tour package. MSA Cultural Tours will contribute \$100.00 to The Second Half for everyone in the course who participates in the tour. Please note this tour was originally scheduled for October 2020 but due to the pandemic was moved to October 2021. The 2020 Tour was sold out, but because of the change of dates, we now have a
